

## **FACILITATOR WORKSHEET**

This session is intended to be an open-ended conversation with steering committee members around their vision for their town forest, their expectations for the plan, their ideas for the future, and the potential challenges they see in the process. The main thrust of the conservation should be around understanding the committee members' visions for their town forest.

Please take notes on this sheet for your future use!

Start the discussion by stating a few ground rules and expectations for the conversation:

- 1. Let the committee know the main thrust of the discussion: understanding their visions for their town forest.
- 2. Let them know that this is a point in the process where we want to get everything on the table. This is a brainstorming session where there are no wrong answers. Big ideas and visionary thinking is encouraged. Try to imagine an ideal future without all the constraints they are experiencing today.
- 3. While there are no off-limit topics, we do want to stay at the "10,000-foot visioning level" and not get bogged down in specifics in this discussion. This discussion is about the future direction, uses and general tone and feeling of the forest. We should talk about uses, but try to stay out of the weeds on specific facilities, activities or policies. If it feels we have gone beyond the "visioning level" on certain topics the facilitator may ask folks to shelve the specifics for later discussions.
- 4. We've got just one hour—so we need stay focused—but don't worry there will be plenty of opportunities to provide further input.

After the ground rules have been established you should allow everyone to introduce themselves. Ask participants to not only say their name, but to also say a few words about what brought them to the town forest steering committee. It might be specific passions, concerns, roles in the community, etc.
